AAUS Foundation Scholarship Awards 2016

The AAUS Foundation offers three competitive scholarship programs: the Kathy Johnston English (KE) award for doctoral-level students, the Kevin Gurr (KG) award for master-level students, and the Hollis gear award. This year, as in most other years, there were applicants for the AAUS scholarships whose academic advisors were reviewers or members of the scholarship committee. It is the policy of this committee that in these cases, advisors are not involved in the reviewing or ranking of their own students' proposals.

First place awards (KE and KG) are \$3000; second place awards are \$1500. A total of 35 proposals were reviewed (18 KE and 17 KG). Proposals ranged from tropical to temperate studies and spanned fields from ecology to archaeology. Special thanks to the seven anonymous reviewers, and best wishes to all who participated.

AAUS Foundation Update

The AAUS Foundation had a productive 2016, disbursing nearly \$13,000 in scholarship funds, including first place and runner-up awards for both doctoral and master candidates, the Dr. Lee H Somers AAUS Scientific Diving intern award, a Best Student paper award, and two Kevin Flanagan Student Travel awards. We have also had some fundraising success. Our donation drive at the University of Rhode Island symposium, combined with efforts earlier in the year, raised over \$19,000 for scholarships, including \$2,750 for the Kevin Flanagan Student Travel award. Significant contributors to the Student Travel Award included the University of Rhode Island Sea Grant and the family of Kevin Flanagan in honor of his father, bringing the fund to within \$5,000 of the \$60,000 required to make this a permanently endowed award. Scholarship funding was enhanced by the many sponsors of the symposium and by sales of the Kathy Johnston English raffle tickets, prints, cards and calendars. 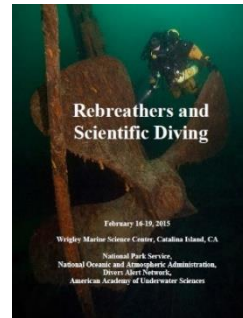
2017 Dr. Lee H. Somers AAUS Scientific Diving Internship Host

OWUSS is currently taking applications for the 2017 Dr. Lee H. Somers AAUS Scientific Diving Internship. Intern applicants must be students from colleges and universities and must have an interest in science and diving. The program runs primarily from mid-May through August and will include training at one of several AAUS organizational member sites. This training will give the intern the necessary dive qualifications to allow participation on research projects requiring scientific diving and introduce the intern to careers that utilize scientific diving as a tool. Once trained as an AAUS-recognized diver-in-training, interns will participate in underwater field work at one or more locations and research facilities associated with the AAUS. The internship will be supported by funding for travel to/from site, room,

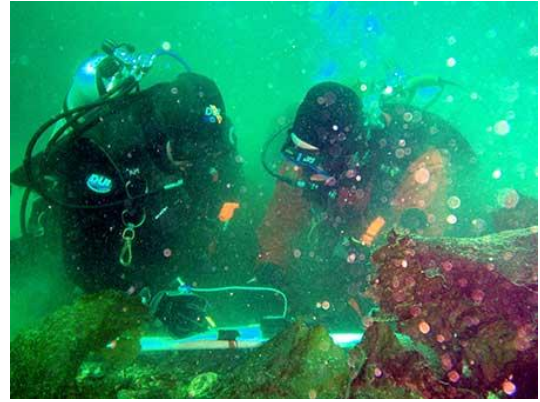
Diving on the R/V Kestrel

Editor Note: AAUS had the pleasure of working with this department, vessel and crew during the 2014 AAUS symposium. They were extraordinarily generous with their time and resources. One of the Department of Fish and Game's (ADF&G) research vessels, the R/V Kestrel, travels around Southeast Region from late March until the middle of September annually as a diving support vessel. The geographic area covers Southeast Alaska from Yakutat to the British Columbia/Alaska border. As the divemaster on board I get the opportunity to work and dive with some pretty talented people. I also get to see and experience some of the most incredible underwater sights. I started recreationally diving in

Seattle, Washington in 1980. I have been diving for ADF&G since the spring of 2001, when we dove off a converted tuna troller, the R/V Sundance, which towed our dive skiffs behind the boat. I have been fortunate to be trained as a NOAA Working Diver, NOAA Dive Master, NOAA Dive Medic, a dive instructor and dive safety officer. I love what I do and feel very fortunate to be doing it.

The diving program provides valuable biological data, stock assessment and information to the resource managers from around the Region. It provides valuable resource data for herring managers and also helps the managers make decisions on the sea cucumber, red urchin and geoduck clam fisheries. All the divers are passionate about diving and the fellowship that comes from spending large amounts of time on a boat, and in skiffs together and working underwater where we depend on each other in some challenging conditions. Even with the cold water we are always excited to get in the water and see what unexpected adventure is awaiting us.
